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3. The King James Version (1611): Protecting the Crown's Profits

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4. The Slave Bible (1807): The Ultimate Corporate Redaction

The most overt, calculated example of altering the text for economic profit is the **Slave Bible** (formally titled *Select Parts of the Holy Bible for the Use of the Negro Slaves in the British West India Islands*).

Published in London in 1807, this Bible was engineered by British plantation owners and corporate colonialists who wanted to **convert enslaved people to Christianity** to make them **docile**, but feared that the actual Bible would inspire them to revolt and destroy the plantation economy.

- **Massive Textual Deletion:** A standard Bible has 1,189 chapters. The Slave Bible was aggressively edited down to just 232 chapters. They deleted roughly 90% of the Old Testament and 50% of the New Testament.
- **What They Erased:** They systematically cut out any verse that mentioned freedom, liberation, or economic justice.
 - The entire story of the Exodus (Moses freeing the slaves from Egyptian oppression) was completely erased.
 - Verses like Galatians 3:28 ("*There is neither slave nor free... you are all one*") were cut.
- **What They Kept:** They deliberately left in and highlighted verses that commanded total submission to masters, such as Ephesians 6:5 ("*Slaves, obey your earthly masters with respect and fear*") and verses regarding paying your masters and rulers what is owed.

It was a highly calculated, **redacted manual designed entirely to protect the financial assets and free labor of plantation owners** using a heavily weaponized, corporate edit of religion.

The Specific British Laws that led to the creation of that Slave Bible

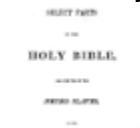
4. The 1600s Precedent: The Legal Status of Conversion
